The possessive personal pronouns are words that show ownership and replace nouns in a sentence. These words include "mine," "yours," "his," "hers," "ours," and "theirs." Possessive personal pronouns can function as subjects, objects, adjectives, or even nouns. For example: "These are my sweets" uses the possessive pronoun "my" to show ownership. In contrast, possessive determiners like "my," "your," "his," "her," "its," "our," and "their" can also function as pronouns. They modify nouns, but can replace noun phrases in a sentence. For instance: "Is that the King's hat?" uses the possessive determiner "the King's" to show ownership. The term "possessive personal pronoun" can be confusing because some grammarians classify it differently depending on whether they are using traditional or contemporary grammar. In traditional grammar, only standalone pronouns like "mine," "yours," and "ours" are considered possessive personal pronouns. However, in contemporary grammar, both the "mine" type and the "my" type are recognized as pronouns. Here is a list of personal pronouns with their corresponding possessive determiners and possessive personal pronouns: * I - my - mine * you - your - yours * he - his * she - her - hers * it - its * we - our - ours * they - their - theirs For example: "I always check if the art across the street is better than mine" uses the possessive pronoun "mine" to show ownership. The possessive personal pronouns ("yours," "hers," etc.) do not cause too many writing issues for native English speakers. However, the same cannot be said for possessive determiners ("your," "its," etc.). With possessive determiners, the most common mistake is confusing a possessive determiner (e.g., "its," "their," "your") with an identical-sounding contraction (e.g., "it's," "they're," "you're"). Read more about confusing possessive determiners with contractions. Here is the main writing issue related to possessive personal pronouns. By far the most common mistake related to possessive personal pronouns is including an apostrophe with "yours," "hers," "ours," or "theirs." There are no apostrophes in any possessive pronouns. When we fall in love, we feel that this person is ours and we are theirs by our mutual volition. (Pronouns are words like I, me (personal pronouns) or my, mine (possessive pronouns).)
