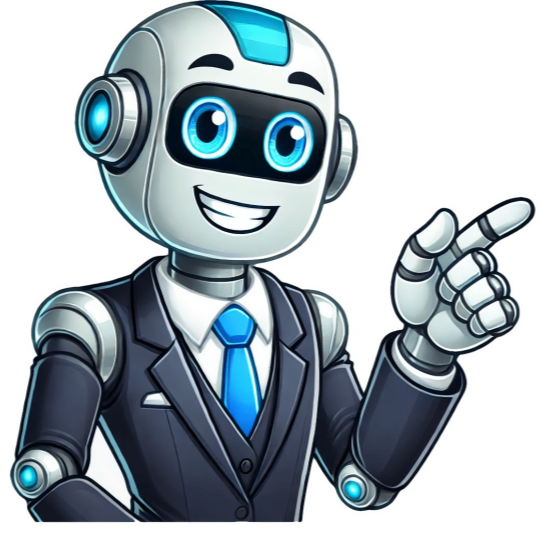


I'm human





The Three Stooges are central to a trial where their friend, a dancer at a nightclub where they perform music, is accused of murder. The trio manages to disrupt the proceedings but ultimately uncover the true culprit's identity. One of the most iconic and hilarious Three Stooges episodes is a standout among fans. The episode's never-ending supply of one-liners, particularly "he wants to know if you swear, no but I know all the words," leaves audiences in stitches. Reviewer SidneyJB praised Suzanne Kaaren, who played Gayle Tempest alongside the Stooges. Kaaren's chemistry with the trio was undeniable, showcasing her excellent timing as a "straight man" amidst their antics. Several reviewers echoed similar sentiments, declaring the episode one of the best Stooges shorts ever. One fan noted that it was a masterclass in comedic writing and execution, while another praised Curly's signature insanity. The episode has stood the test of time, with many viewers revisiting it multiple times without losing their sense of humor. The comments section is filled with praise for the episode's ability to balance slapstick humor with clever wordplay. One fan even shared a personal anecdote about seeing the Stooges live at a Milwaukee theater during the Great Depression, where they carefully counted tickets before taking the stage due to past financial mishaps. This one's a fan favorite amongst Three Stooges enthusiasts, including myself. Their early work from 1934 is generally solid, but they started rehashing ideas by the mid-30s. This short was ahead of its time in poking fun at the legal profession and courts. During one memorable scene, Moe swallows a harmonica and gets turned into an organ-grinder. The Stooges even cut to the audience as they laugh at the antics, with Sol Horwitz, Moe's dad, making a cameo appearance in the first row. Reviewers have praised this short for its humor, with one calling it "one of the funnier" Stooges shorts. Another highlights the hilarious moments, including Moe and Larry playing tic-tac-toe on an attorney's jacket, and Curly struggling with a gun. Disorder in the Court is a 1936 American short film directed by Preston Black and starring the Three Stooges. It was released on May 30, 1936, and features the comedians as key witnesses at a murder trial. The Stooges were known for their slapstick humor, and this short is no exception, with plenty of physical comedy and witty one-liners. Despite being a short film, Disorder in the Court has become a beloved classic among fans of the Three Stooges. The courtroom erupts into chaos when Larry mistakenly identifies the court clerk's toupee as a tarantula, leading to Moe discharging the guard's firearm. The situation escalates with Curly and Moe enacting the purported murder. A parrot is later discovered carrying a confession from Buck Wing, the true culprit. With Tempest's innocence established, the proceedings conclude amidst a comedic mishap involving a ruptured fire hose.
