Elementary ed masters programs

What type of learner are you? An online master's in elementary education might be perfect for you if you ask yourself these questions: What's your budget like? Online learning can be more affordable due to discounted tuition rates and no on-campus costs. Are you disciplined, organized, and driven? Distance learning suits students who work well independently. Do you have other obligations? Online programs offer flexibility, ideal for parents or those working full-time. For those pursuing a master's degree in elementary education, the total cost can range from \$23,100 to \$40,000 over two years. While this may seem expensive, many online degrees offer greater value for students who need flexibility due to work or family commitments. A master's in elementary education often leads to increased salary and advancement opportunities, particularly in public school districts. University of Central Florida's Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) in Elementary Education is a 9-credit online program designed for North Carolina licensed and employed elementary teachers. The program builds on the elementary graduate certificate and offers a mix of asynchronous and synchronous online courses, focusing on classroom management, leadership, and data analysis strategies. UCF's Master of Education in Elementary Education and K-State's Master of Arts in Teaching Elementary Offer Specialized Programs for Florida Teachers and Kansas Educators Respectively!!! UCF's M.Ed. in elementary education offers specializations in reading, English as a second language, gifted education, and exceptional education, catering to teachers with temporary certificates who can earn their professional certificate by completing the Florida Teacher Certification Examination. This program focuses on K-6 educators, providing courses in mentoring and clinical supervision, as well as understanding gifted students. Conversely, K-State's Master of Arts in Teaching Elementary program provides a self-paced, practitioner and license-seeking track with flexible asynchronous schedules, allowing graduates to complete their degree in under 12 months. This online program is approved by the Kansas State Department of Education and offers three annual start dates, scholarships, and an employment rate of 97% within one year. Both programs highlight reduced campus-based fees, lower in-state tuition, and the option for a thesis, providing valuable research experience. K-State Online Program Offers Flexible Schedules K-state offers a license-seeking track with flexible asynchronous schedules, allowing students to graduate in as little as 12 months. The program is approved by the Kansas State Department of Education and provides field experiences that can be completed near the student's location. The online program has three annual start dates, scholarships for 70% of students, and an employment rate of 97% within one year. ECU's Master of Arts in Education ECU offers a master of arts in education with five concentration options, including teacher leadership, teaching children in poverty, early childhood, academically and intellectually gifted, and content pedagogy. The program can be completed online at the student's own pace or as part of a 14-month cohort. The program features a research project or thesis option, plus a comprehensive exam, and is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation. Upon completion, students can qualify to upgrade their K-6 elementary education license to an M level license. Mercer's Advanced Teacher Master of Education Degree Mercer offers a master of education degree with four concentration options, including elementary education, middle grades education, P-12 education, and secondary education. The program is designed for Georgia teachers with a level 4 certification and makes them eligible to upgrade to a level 5 certification upon completion. The online classes run in eight- or 16-week sessions and feature no in-person requirements, though face-to-face meetings with faculty are available if desired. The program offers 3 start dates, allowing students to graduate within 12-16 months with no on-campus requirements. To apply, candidates must have a level 4 teaching certification. The online classes feature synchronous sessions and may require occasional in-person meetings with faculty. Students can choose from four concentration options: elementary education, middle grades education, P-12 education, or secondary education, and pursue two endorsements from among 12 available options. Highlights include the program's flexibility, allowing students to upgrade their certification level upon completion, and its affordable tuition rates for both in-state and out-of-state students. Fordham's Master of Science in Teaching (MST) program offers five licensure tracks for initial teaching licensure in New York, including childhood education and students with disabilities. The program requires a valid educator certificate, minimum 3.0 GPA, and in-person practicum requirements. Graduate tuition rates for out-of-state students range from \$38,139 to \$44,000. Online enrollment accounts for about 29% of total student body. Undergraduate tuition rates are significantly higher at \$53,070 for both in-state and out-of-state students. The online master's program in elementary education at one university is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation. This program helps students qualify for teaching licensure within 20 months. It includes courses on antiracist pedagogy, practice-based teacher education, and the science of learning, along with a 600-hour internship. Students in this program participate in an online cohort, completing around two hours of synchronous classes, one to two hours of asynchronous classes, and five to seven hours of self-managed assignments each week. One university's program has no specific degree or licensure requirement for admission. It also offers a practicum in the student's state and boasts a 100% employment rate within six months. However, this program does have some drawbacks, including in-person practicum requirements and one of the highest tuition rates on the list. Another university offers an online master's program in education for elementary education that is specifically designed for licensed K-6 classroom teachers looking to advance their careers. This 30- or 33-credit program runs asynchronously online and features courses on issues and trends in curriculum, as well as integrated science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) activities in elementary school. Students can choose between a thesis or non-thesis track and graduate in five semesters. This research-focused program has no campus or in-person requirements. One university's online master of arts in education program for elementary education offers three concentrations: early childhood education, elementary education, and reading/literacy instruction. The program is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation and includes a practicum experience. Ball State's online Master of Arts in Education (MA.Ed.) program in elementary education offers concentrations in early childhood education, elementary education, and reading/literacy instruction, as well as specializations in over seven fields, such as autism, middle school education, and educational technology for teachers. The program is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation and does not require campus visits or in-person attendance. While it does not lead to initial licensure, it can help advance teaching careers and prepare students for doctoral programs. Highlights include no GRE requirement, classes averaging 20 students, and potential contributions to Indiana teacher licensure renewal requirements. The program is designed to accommodate working professionals with a minimum 2.75 GPA admission requirement. Notably, the MA.Ed. does not lead to initial licensure, but can still positively impact teaching careers. Teachers are often underpaid despite their high level of education, with many earning below-average salaries. A master's degree in elementary education can significantly increase earnings by up to 27%, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE).
